Southern Giant Petrel (Macronectes giganteus) Behavior - Two populations sharing the nesting burrows

In the bird-world, nest sites tend to be sacrosanct. Where possible, a good many species return to the same site each year to breed, A nest site stolen is a nest site violated. But what is different with this bird, is that it shares its burrows with another breeding pair of the same species. The two sets of owners, however do not actually meet in the burrow. It is because they have different breeding seasons; in effect, they time-share.
