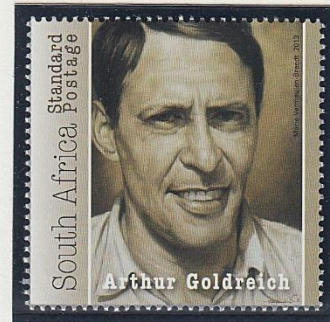


The Rivonia Trial took its name from Rivonia, the suburb of Johannesburg where leaders had been arrested, and documents discovered, on 11 July 1963 at

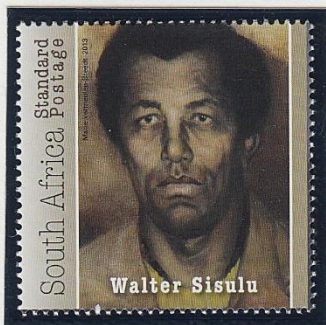
Liliesleaf Farm privately owned by



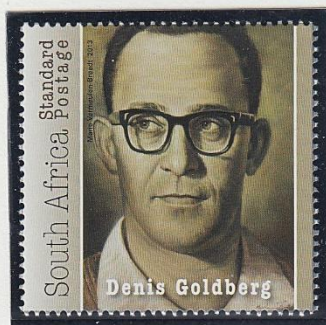
Arthur Goldreich.
