Each circle had separate series of numbers starting from No.1 allotted to Head Office, Bombay, Madras and Bengal circles adopted the Old numbers. Any new post office opened was allotted new numbers. In 1865, due to the transfer of District post in large scale to Imperial post, the numbers increased substantially.

AMRITSAR CITY POST OFFICE has the unique distinction of being the only post office to have a fractional number " 27 1/2 ". Since 27 has already been allotted to AMRITSAR and 28 to PHAGWARA, the newly opened City post office was issued at first , the GOOJERAT no 138 in Type 5, Later on, it was issued the fractional number " 27 1/2 " shown on the cover above.

AMRITSAR, Spelt variously as UMRITSUR, UMRITSHUR had its office number 172 in 1855 series and used it until 1864. It also used " 72" Duplex between 1861-65, Number 75 upto

1867 and finally settled for its new number * 27" in the 1865 series.

5.0. The Other Circle cancellations - Bengal Circle. Type, 10

The Duplex cancellation adopted by the Bengal and Burma circle is similar to the one adopted by the Bombay Circle, burt the left hand portion shows two concentric circles. The outer circle has diameter of 23mm. The outer space between the two circle shows the office name. Two fleurons flank the town name, but a sub-type shows no fleurons. The date is contained within the inner circle. The right hand side is a diamond of parallel bars rising from the left to the right and showing the office number.

This type was introduced in 1862 and continued till 1873. Cancellation in blue are known.


5.0. The Other Circle cancellations - The Central Provinces, Type, 11.

In April / May 1867, the circle consisted post offices transferred from Bombay and North Western priorinces. The Berar was added in April 1870. There were two series of numbers in 1867 and 1871.

In 1867 type 9 and 11 are used. Type 11 is used by Central provinces only.

In 1871 Type 8 - Single and Type 11 are used.

Type 11. Is a special Central province cancellation consisting of a circle divided in to sections by fine parallel lines, and a number inset with capital letters "C" and "P" at the top and bottom respectively of the figures. It was during the period from 1867 -1873.

The Central Provinces Circle was formed in 1866-67. The all India type 9 cancellor was in use in the area at that time. While adopting the type 9 cancellor the circle also introduced a distinctive obliterator. While some offices used type 9, others used the new type. A few offices appear to have received bothe types.

This type is a duplex. The Ifdet part circle is having a date and name, right part circle shows a circle filled with a series of fine horizontal parallel lines, space being provided for the number in the centre. The letter 'C' ABOVE KAND THE LETTER " P" Below.

The Madras Circle. Type, 12.

Madras Circle used a new type between 1866-1878. It is a diamond of bars parallel to the shorter diogonal which break off at the center to show a blank space at the center. The office number shown in this blank space. This type appears to have been used side by side with the all - India type 9 duplex cancellation. There are several sub types and it accures in many sizes. Cancellation in colour are also known.





5.0. The Other Circle cancellations - The North west province Duplex 1871-73. Type, 13.

Type 13 is a cancellation provided for the old North West Provinces with adjoining Native States administered By the N.W.P. Postal circle. Type 13 is a simple design offering no complicating variations and is composed of two concentric circles, the inner circle being divided in to sections by a series of parallel lines and containing a number in large figures in the center. The space between the two concentric circles contains the capital letters 'N.W.P." Evenly spaced. It was used for a short period between 1872 and 1873 only.









Type. 13. Always occurs in duplex associated with an exactly similar pair of concentric circles; the name of the town lies between the circles at the top, and in central space appears the day and month (but not always the year) between two ros of about 7 short diagonal parallel lines. The impressions of this side of the duplex are also usually indistinct.

6.0. Some plain cancellations before 1873. **Type 14.**

During some ten years before 1873, a number of plain cancellations were in use. In the postal manual of 1873, the use of a plain dotted / barred cancellations without any number is prescribed for "Experimental" post offices. It is therefore, likely that the plain cancellations found in use in small offices and branch offices of urban areas were given to them as and when they were newly opened. In time, it is possible that they received numbered cancellations to replace the plain one. A few offices might have continued to use the plain cancellations even after the probationary stage.





7.0. All India Series of 1873 - 84.

In the year 1873 there was such a bewildering variety of cancellations in use in the different circles that the Central Postal Authorities decided to devise a uniform type of cancellation for all the post offices in the country. This they did by allotting to each office a circle letter and an office number. The circle letter was generally the initial of the Headquirter of the circle.

Thus "A" stood for Allahabad, Headquarter of N.W. Province circle, "B" Bombay, "C" for Calcutta, Bengal, "D" for Dinapore, Bihar, "E" however stood for East Bengal with Dacca as headquarter, "I" for Indore, Central India, "J" for Ajmere (Jeypore?) Rajaputana, "K" for Karachi, Sind, "L" for Lahore, Punjab, "M" for Madras, Madras circle, "N" for Nagpore, Central provinces, "O" for Oudh with headquarter at Lucknoq, "R" for Rangoon, Burma, "S" for Shillong, Assam and "T" for Travelling post offices.



The system of numbering was rather complicated. Disbursing offices in each circle were numbered in a consecutive series commencing from the Headquarter Office, which had the number 1. So, an obliterator for a distributing office would show the circle letter, and across it the office number. The whole was arranged in a barred square.


